

#### MEET THE TEACHERS

We are Miss Loveless and Mrs Jopson. As the computing subject leads, we aim for our children to confidently and independently use and apply information technology skills to support and extend their learning. Technology is everywhere and will play a significant part in children's lives. Therefore, at Oak Lodge, we want children to use technology purposefully, responsibly and most importantly safely. We are lucky to have a set of iPads in each year group which our FSA kindly helped to fund.

Over the last year we have developed a broad computing curriculum which encompasses computer science, information technology and digital literacy. In addition to discrete subject teaching of computing skills we use IT to support, enhance and enrich the whole school curriculum; it is an integral part of children's learning.

Computer science and coding is the core of computing and underpins the whole of the subject. We have bought many new resources to support the children's learning. For example, the children now have opportunities to code robotic devices, such as Bee-bots and Spheros. Information technology provides a context for the use of computers in society. It focuses on how computers are used in different ways. For example, we teach the children to create presentations and animations. The children have particularly enjoyed using Green Screen technology to make short videos. Our computing curriculum ensures that pupils become digitally literate and are able to use the internet for effective research. They are also taught how to keep themselves safe online.

We have introduced a new learning platform called 'Seesaw'. This enables the children to share some of their work in school with you at home and allows the children to build up their own learning portfolio. Seesaw is also used for children to share their homework with their teacher.

Through pupil voice, the children show their love and enthusiasm for computing lessons.







In computing I have enjoyed learning to use Scratch Junior on the I-pads. I like using block coding to make objects move and disappear.

#### Gabby, Robins

I am Mrs Mitchell, I currently teach in reception and I am also the DT subject leader. At Oak Lodge, we aim to teach a broad, balanced and exciting curriculum and DT is an important part of this. DT is a subject where children can be creative, experiment and develop a wide variety of skills. They can also apply skills they have learnt in other curriculum areas such as maths, English and science.

Last year, I introduced a new DT curriculum to Oak Lodge, which has been very successful. We follow the 'Kapow' scheme of work. Each year group completes five units over the year, including textiles, cooking and nutrition, structures, mechanisms and electrical systems. This allows children to develop their skills in different areas. Every unit follows a similar structure where children design, make and then evaluate a product. The children design and make a fantastic range of products including smoothies, bookmarks, pop up books, puppets, slingshot cars, fairground rides, bridges, savoury tarts, windmills, waistcoats to name but a few!



When speaking to the children they speak passionately about DT which is lovely to hear. The lessons are memorable and they show pride in the products they have made. It is not always possible for children to bring these home to show off, particularly if they have worked in a group, but you should be able to see their wonderful creations on Seesaw.

As part of the curriculum, we teach children how to look after our world. In DT this involves being sustainable and using recycled materials wherever possible. This is why we often ask for donations from home. We also research a range of designers from all over the world for children to aspire to. Hopefully we'll see children from Oak Lodge being the next Coco Channel, Zaha Hadid or Jamie Oliver! Next, I would like to provide more opportunities to enrich the DT curriculum further. It would be great to have people from our local community come in to speak to the children or work with them. If you work in an area linked to DT (architects, designers, chefs, builders, seamstresses etc) and you think you could help with this please get in touch via the admin email.

## YEAR 4 TRIP TO DEPTFORD CREEK

Year 4 enjoyed a fantastic trip to Deptford Creek Discovery Centre.

They took part in a low tide walk and enjoyed conducting a duck race to measure the speed of the river. They also enjoyed fishing in the river where they observed creatures such as Chinese mitten crab, shrimp and larvae. In the afternoon, they sketched the river at high tide and enjoyed a hands-on session looking at various historic artefacts found in the river.





## SAM REARDON

We were delighted to welcome back former pupil Sam, to talk to the children, answer their questions and present medals to the Quadkids team.

He always enjoyed sporting success at Oak Lodge and has happy memories of the Crystal Palace Cross Country.

Sam ran as part of the British 4x400m relay team at the 2022 World Athletics Indoor Championships. Aged 18, he was the youngest member of the squad. Sam finished fifth in the 800m race at the 800m at the 2022 World Athletics U20 Championships.

In February 2023 Reardon ran 46.96 over 400 metres to win his first national championship gold medal at the 2023 British Indoor Athletics Championships. We wish him all the best as he tries to qualify for the Olympics


## SPECIAL ACHIEVEMENTS
